
INFORMATION FOR AUTHORS

The *Journal* conforms to the "Uniform requirements for manuscripts submitted to biomedical journals" (*N Engl J Med* 1991;324: 424-428).

The *Journal of Clinical Ligand Assay* is published quarterly, in the Spring, Summer, Fall, and Winter by the Clinical Ligand Assay Society (CLAS).

In addition to review articles pertinent to a selected theme, the *Journal of Clinical Ligand Assay* publishes contributed articles relevant to the field of ligand assay technology and the application of such technologies to clinical and biological science. These may include reports of original studies on basic, clinical, or analytical aspects of ligand binding assays either as full manuscripts or as a Brief Communication of no more than 6 pages. The *Journal of Clinical Ligand Assay* encourages the submission of kit or method evaluations related to ligand assays. The opinions expressed in published articles are those of the authors and do not constitute an endorsement by the CLAS or its officers. The Publications Committee of CLAS has adopted the following policies and editorial style guidelines for use in the *Journal of Clinical Ligand Assay*.

PRIOR PUBLICATION. The Journal will not consider for publication a paper that has been published previously or submitted or accepted for publication elsewhere. Papers which follow a preliminary report or abstract, however, will be considered. A statement describing the preliminary publication should be included in the transmittal letter.

TRANSFER OF COPYRIGHT. It is understood that the Journal will maintain the copyright of all published manuscripts. A Transfer of Copyright form must be signed and submitted before final acceptance.

GENERAL INFORMATION. Each manuscript should include: title page, abstract, text, references, legends, acknowledgments, figures, and tables. All sections of the paper must be typed double-spaced. Submit an original and two copies of the manuscript with two sets of unmounted illustrations along with a transmittal letter to the Editor.

Disk submission: The final revision of each manuscript should be submitted in computer disk format using MSWord or WordPerfect, along with two printed copies. The following style guidelines apply:

1. References should be cited in parentheses in the text in order of appearance.
2. Handwritten changes are not acceptable.
3. Papers must be written in clear and concise English.
4. Generic names should be used. When necessary, include references to manufacturers in parentheses, citing the name and location.

MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

Full length manuscripts: When appropriate, include sections for: Abstract, Introduction, Methods, Results, and Discussion. Details are provided below.

Title Page: The title should be short and concise, with maximum information content. The title should be followed by author names, including degrees and first names, but *excluding titles or places of employment*. Include a sentence "From the [Department, Institution, City]". This must be followed by a separate sentence beginning with "Correspondence and reprint requests to: [Name, full address]."

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names should be in italic type and abbreviated according to the *List of Journals Indexed in Index Medicus*. "Unpublished observations" and "personal communications" should not be used. Examples of reference styles are as follows:

Journal article:

Chapter in a book:

Hartley IT, Harker JO, Walsh DA: Contemporary issues and new directions in adult development of learning and memory, in Poon LW (ed): *Aging in the 1980's: Psychological issues*. Washington, DC, American Psychological Association, 1980: 239-252.

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Brief communications: This section allows the publication of experimental results that have limited data and scientific commentary that do not require lengthy discussion. Technical notes, method modifications, problems and solutions, and method evaluations are appropriate topics. In general, the stylistic requirements for full manuscripts apply. However, the following specific requirements apply to Brief Communications: Papers should be no more than six (double-spaced) typed pages with no more than two tables and figures. References should be included. If the subject warrants, deviation from standard scientific format (i.e., Introduction, Methods, Results, etc.) is acceptable.

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
